## 2014 Report to Our Community Providing **HOPE** through a full spectrum of services to the most vulnerable in our community.

After forty years of working with the most vulnerable people in our community, I am glad that in our county, state and across the nation, we are experiencing the most significant improvements in the identification and treatment of psychiatric symptoms. Through a well-planned set of initiatives at every level there is momentum to invest wisely in systems of care that produce measureable outcomes that increase wellness, functioning, and self-sufficiency. These initiatives address multiple determinants of health, not just accommodating genetic predisposition and not just traditional medical services.

Within the greater landscape of the full spectrum of healthcare, Navos' specialty niche is treating mental health and substance use disorders, especially for those living in poverty with the most serious and persistent illnesses. Navos works diligently to be a vital member of the greater community's increasingly coordinated network of services and opportunities to create health and self-sufficiency for all in our area.

At Navos, when we diagnose serious mental illnesses and substance use disorders, we are confident that we can help our clients learn to manage the symptoms and eventually focus their energy on the gratifying aspects of life like learning, working, loving, giving, and creating. The people who seek help from us are often desperate, dealing with several concurrent and discouraging problems. Our inpatient programs make the difference between death and life. People come to our inpatient psychiatric facilities determined to kill themselves, and often within weeks they have become re-focused on living, with hope to thrive again one day.

One area that sets us apart as a community mental health provider is that our continuum of programs and services are vast. The coordinated care we provide — whether for an infant, an adolescent, an adult or the most elderly person — is rooted in best practices, pragmatic assistance, and at times creative, encouraging and hopeful experiences.

## 014 Outcomes



INFANT AND EARLY CHILDHOOD MENTAL HEALTH PROGRAM AGES 0-5 Helped 205 vulnerable babies and very young children and their parents/caregiver to form secure, nurturing attachments and break cycles of abuse and neglect with in-home Child-Parent Psychotherapy, parent education and support, and case management.



**INDEPENDENCE BRIDGE** Young adults, ages 18-24, most transitioning from foster care, have their own furnished studio apartment and are receiving

life skills and other support services.



90% of people with serious mental illness are unemployed

### **EMPLOYMENT SERVICES**

126 adults with serious mental illness increased their employability and self-sufficiency by improving their job skills, gaining work experience, developing a resume, and practicing their interview skills.

INTEGRATED PRIMARY CARE CLINIC TO TREAT THE WHOLE PERSON Because adults with serious mental illness die 13 – 24 years before their cohorts from preventable diseases, Navos is one of the first in the nation to create a "Patient-Centered Health Care Home" in partnership with Public Health - Seattle & King County. Providing a medical clinic within a mental health center integrates behavioral healthcare, primary care, health education, and chemical dependency services, improving the lives of over 950 people since its opening in October of 2012.

NEW TREATMENT CENTER ON BUCOLIC LAKE BURIEN

Construction was completed for the new Behavioral Healthcare Center

for Children, Youth & Families on Lake Burien. The Seattle Children's Home programs from our Queen Anne campus relocated to the new campus, where services for vulnerable children and youth continues.



### PACT (PROGRAM FOR ASSERTIVE COMMUNITY TREATMENT)

Every day, hundreds of severely mentally ill Seattle residents make their homes on the streets, shelters, and greenbelts of the city. Our multi-disciplinary PACT team reaches out to help. We connect homeless individuals with housing, treatment, and wraparound services, resulting in fewer people on the street, in jail, and in state hospitals.








